#### Reflection

Though it is the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, today also carries a significance that reaches beyond the immediate moment. In the older liturgical calendar, this Sunday was known as Septuagesima Sunday, marking seventy days before Easter. While not yet in the Lenten season, this former observance served as a subtle reminder that the Christian life is one of preparation, attentiveness, and renewal. True discipleship does not unfold by chance; it requires intention, commitment, and the willingness to be shaped by Christ's teaching.

The Gospel this Sunday presents St Luke's version of the Beatitudes (Luke 6:17, 20-26), a passage that upends conventional wisdom. While St Matthew's account speaks of poverty "in spirit," St Luke's

Gospel is uncomfortably direct: "Blessed are you who are poor," "Blessed are you who hunger now," "Blessed are you who weep now." Christ speaks not in abstractions but in concrete realities, showing a divine preference for those who have little and suffer much. Just as striking are his warnings: "Woe to you who are rich," "Woe to you who are full now." It is not wealth or comfort itself that Our Lord condemns, but the peril of self-sufficiency - the illusion that earthly security is enough.

To be a disciple of Christ means to embrace a new way of seeing, where the world's measures of success - power, wealth, influence - are revealed as fleeting. Christ does not merely sympathise with the poor and suffering; he stands among them. To follow our Lord is to adopt his

priorities, to take to heart what he takes to heart.

Saint John Paul II frequently returned to this theme, insisting that the Christian cannot remain indifferent in the face of suffering. In *Sollicitudo Rei Socialis*, he wrote that the "preferential option for the poor" is not a passing concern but a demand of justice and love. It is not an ideology but a requirement of the Gospel. True discipleship, he taught, means recognising Christ in those the world forgets and allowing our own lives to be shaped by that recognition.

As disciples of Christ, are we willing to let Christ's words unsettle us? Are we prepared to measure our lives not by what we possess, but by the love we give? This is the challenge of discipleship: not to settle for comfort, but to choose the way of Christ.
