Reflection

In his third catechesis on prayer, Pope Benedict XVI explored the biblical roots of the dialogue between God and man, particularly through the lens of the covenant. He initiated this journey with a profound examination of Abraham, the patriarch whose intercessory prayer for Sodom and Gomorrah exemplified a model of deep, faithful engagement with the divine will.

Benedict XVI emphasized that prayer was a universal phenomenon, transcending cultural and temporal boundaries. He began by highlighting the biblical narrative of Genesis 18, where the depravity of Sodom and Gomorrah prompted God to reveal His intentions to Abraham. This disclosure set the stage for Abraham's intercession, a poignant illustration of prayer as a conduit for divine justice and mercy.

Abraham's plea, "Will you indeed destroy the righteous with the wicked?" (Gn 18:23-25), stressed the patriarch's bold confrontation with

God, advocating for a justice that spares the innocent and seeks the transformation of the guilty through forgiveness.

The Pope noted Abraham's persistence in reducing the number of righteous needed to spare the cities, from fifty down to ten, each decrement revealing the depth of God's mercy. This mediation reflected a divine justice that went beyond human retributive measures, embracing a salvific intent that aimed to transform and save.

Abraham's intercession, as Benedict XVI observed, "did not invoke a merely compensatory form of justice but rather an intervention of salvation," which highlighted the transformative power of divine forgiveness that converted sinners and created new avenues for righteousness. The late Pope further explained that God's mercy extended even beyond the scenario in Sodom.

Through the prophet Jeremiah, God indicated that just one righteous

person could save Jerusalem, a prefiguration of the ultimate fulfilment of divine mercy in Jesus Christ.

The Incarnation, the Pope articulated, was the embodiment of this divine justice and mercy, where God himself became the righteous one to bring salvation to all. This theological insight culminated in the recognition that through Jesus, the prayer of intercession achieved its fullest expression, bridging human need with divine compassion.

The catechesis concluded by urging believers to open their hearts to God's abundant mercy and persistently pray for the salvation of humanity, trusting in God's immense love and desire to forgive and save. Abraham's example teaches the power and necessity of intercessory prayer in aligning human desires with divine will, seeking not merely justice but transformative mercy.
