Reflection

This Sunday's Gospel (Luke 6:27continues from last week's Beatitudes, but with a distinctive emphasis. While Matthew's account emphasises the interior dispositions of the Christian—meekness, righteousness, purity of heart—Luke directs our attention to those in real and dire need. The poor, the hungry, the sorrowfulthese are the blessed ones. But Christ does not stop at declaring their blessedness. He places upon His disciples the weight of a great responsibility: to love even those who hate us, to give without hesitation, to lend without expectation, to forgive without reservation. The mercy of God must be made visible in the lives of those who follow Him.

At first, Luke's emphasis appears to be on material possessions. His Gospel, written for a more affluent audience than that of Mark or Matthew, constantly warns of the dangers of wealth and the obligations that come with it. Possessions, if clung to, corrupt the heart; but if freely given, they become an instrument of grace.

Yet the generosity Christ demands is not merely financial. It reaches into every fibre of our being. It is a generosity of spirit, a disposition of the soul that transcends calculation and self-interest.

This is the heart of Christ's teaching: "Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful." Unlike Matthew, who records Christ's exhortation as "Be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matt 5:48), Luke presents the perfection of the Christian life not in terms of an ideal but as something intimately bound to the life of the soul—mercy. True perfection is not found in human achievement but in becoming

ever more conformed to the divine life, which is, above all, love poured out. To be merciful is to enter into the very movement of God's own heart.

This Sunday being the second before lent, the Church reminds us that our exterior works must correspond to an interior transformation. Lent is not merely about disciplines of fasting and almsgiving, but about the reshaping of our very selves in the likeness of Christ. Mercy is not simply an action we perform; it must become a virtue, a habit of the soul. And virtue is formed not in a single moment, but through daily fidelity, through the discipline of grace, through the quiet and oft-hidden struggle to conform our hearts to Christ's. If we do not first cultivate an interior disposition of mercy, our Lenten practices risk being mere outward observance.
