Reflection

As October ends, marked by the turning back of clocks and shorter days, we sense the year's end approaching. This natural transition into November brings profound significance in the Church's liturgical calendar. It is a time when the Church invites us to engage deeply with themes of sanctity, remembrance, and eschatological hope, beginning with the solemn observances of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day.

While modern Halloween celebrations often focus on the eerie and macabre, they can distract from the original Christian meaning of All Hallows' Eve. Rooted in the vigil of All Saints' Day, Halloween reminds us not of darkness but of light—the light of the holy lives that have illuminated the faithful's path across the centuries. Christians are invited to reclaim this time for prayer, reflection, and

a deeper understanding of the communion of saints.

Pope Benedict XVI, in his 2006 homily for the Feast of All Saints,

expressed the essence of this feast. He described it as a day when the Church "raises her eyes to Heaven to celebrate the feast of all those who already participate in the eternal happiness of God."

This reflection highlights the universal call to holiness, an invitation extended to every believer to seek sanctity as a vocation for all. The saints are not distant figures but our "older brothers and sisters" who have "travelled the same difficult path of life" and now rejoice with God, reminding us that sanctity is within reach for everyone.

The following day, All Souls' Day, is when the Church collectively prays for those who have departed this life. It's a day to remember and pray for the souls in Purgatory, reflecting the deep communion between the Church Militant, the Church Triumphant, and the Church Suffering. The liturgy is marked by a sombre yet hopeful tone, encouraging the faithful to intercede for their loved ones who have died,

trusting in God's mercy and the promise of eternal life.

As we step into November, these back-to-back feasts directs our thoughts to the ultimate destiny of the human soul, prompting reflection on our lives and preparation for eternity. While the world emphasizes the temporal and sensational aspects of Halloween, the Church calls for a spiritual reawakening. Observing these feasts encourages us to look beyond the material, remember those who have gone before us, and draw inspiration from their example.

Contemplating the saints and departed souls invites us to examine our own lives, cultivate a deeper relationship with God, and prepare our hearts for eternity. The saints' lives testify to the transformative power of God's grace—a power accessible to all who earnestly seek it. A reminder that the clocks go back on Sun 27 October by one hour.

All Saints Day is a day of Obligation. Thurs 31 Oct 6.30pm is the Vigil Mass and Mass on All Saints Day, Fri 1 Nov will be at 10am. Blessing of the graves will take place at 3 pm on Sunday 3 November: Gathering at the gates of East Sheen Cemetery.
